re-un-ion - noun. 1. A reuniting, or bringing or coming together again. 2. A gathering of persons after some separation.

It's a simple definition for a wonderful event. We attend reunions of all kinds. My father plans our annual family reunion, which is held on an August Sunday in an old Georgia schoolhouse. A friend of mine holds reunions for people we used to work with at a company that no longer exists. Another friend and Army Reservist attends a reunion for his fellow veterans of Desert Storm.

Then there are the college and high school reunions. And in our case, the "SMA All-Class Reunion," set for July 27-29. A chance to see old friends and old places, relive old times and talk about current times. SMA's last class -- which graduated in 1976 -- will celebrate its 25th anniversary this year. We have thousands of alumni, many who live within a day's drive of Staunton. Yet it was unfortunate that, last year, fewer than 100 Old Boys chose to spend a weekend visiting with former cadets, faculty and staff and sharing old times.

Please - accept my personal invitation to attend the 2001 All-Class Reunion.

I learned my favorite quote three decades ago at SMA as a sophomore in Maj. Skeeter Johnson's American History class. There, on a sign in the front of the classroom, he displayed these words by Gen. Robert E. Lee: "Do your duty in all things. You cannot do more. You should never do less."

I feel a duty to be at this year's All-Class Reunion and to be a part of the museum dedication. But more importantly, I want to be there.

SMA LEGACY PROJECTS NEARING COMPLETION

After a 25-year absence, we are finally returning to the Hill! It is hard to believe, but it was only twelve months ago that we opened negotiations with Mary Baldwin College to establish a SMA Memorial Wall and a joint SMA-VWIL Museum. The amazing thing is that the original ideas for these projects came from Mal Kantzler, SMA '65 and Dr. Brenda Bryant, Director, VWIL Program. The SMA Memorial Wall started as an idea to install a single plaque on the MBC campus (formerly SMA campus) to recognize a departed SMA alumnus. The idea for the museum was born from a suggestion by Dr. Bryant at the 1999 SMA Annual Reunion to use one of the rooms in the VWIL Program house as a SMA Museum. Both were good ideas. Both ideas have obviously grown larger than originally envisioned, only proving that good ideas have a tendency to grow. These ideas grew with the strong support of SMA, MBC, VWIL and the SMA Alumni Corps. After receiving approval by MBC and the support of the SMA Alumni Association Board, the SMA Alumni Corps rose to the challenge and matched Henry Hunter's financial contribution, which made the projects achievable.

A lot of work has been happening, much of it in the background, behind the scenes, supported by a wonderful team of alumni that live in and near Staunton (I listed their names in the last newsletter). These projects include the reproduction of the SMA Eagle and the Major Howie bust, development of a

SMA History video, selection of furniture and equipment, collecting articles for display in the museum, etc. All the details, and many more, are being worked on by alumni volunteers, dedicated to creating a lasting legacy of our former school. Construction and renovations are scheduled for completion by mid-May. Move-in will begin in June. That will leave us seven and one-half weeks to prepare for opening ceremonies as part of the SMA Annual Alumni Reunion Weekend festivities.

Although he is not an SMA alumnus, I must also mention Colonel Michael Bissell, USA (Ret.), Commandant of the VWIL Program. Colonel Bissell and I have been working closely on these projects since last May. Colonel Bissell has been serving as the project manager for the SMA Legacy Projects and overseeing the construction effort in renovating the old supply room. Without a doubt, all of the progress that has occurred is due to the support and leadership of Colonel Bissell. We all owe a great deal to his involvement in these projects. For those planning to attend the Annual Alumni Reunion in July, I would encourage each and every one of you to shake the hands of two people - Hunter Henry and Colonel Mike Bissell. Without their support and involvement, none of this would have happened.

So, here we are less than three months from the annual reunion, the grand opening of the SMA-VWIL Museum, and the dedication of the SMA Memorial Wall on Saturday, July 28th. For those of you that have never made a return visit to our former campus and for those that have and experienced the feeling of emptiness at the loss of our great school, this is an event you don't want to miss. After a 25-year

absence, we are finally returning to the Hill! In addition to the SMA Memorial Wall and the SMA-VWIL Museum, our SMA Alumni Association office will also be relocated in an office area in the back of the museum. Our new official alumni association home will be on the Hill.

As part of the SMA Legacy Projects fund-raising campaign, we established a category of contributors (e.g., contributions of \$1,000 or more) known as "Plank Owners"¹. The fund-raising campaign remains active up through the annual reunion in July. For anyone that has not contributed, but would like to, please send in your tax-deductible contribution using the form on the back of the newsletter. If you are interested in being listed as a "Plank Owner" contributor, the final cut-off date to send in your contribution is June 15th. This cut-off date is required in order to allow time for development of the "Plank Owner" plaque, listing the names of the Plank Owner contributors, which will then be placed inside the museum entrance.

Having been involved in this project over the last year or so, I am pleased to see the amount of participation by the SMA Alumni Corps in providing their financial support for these projects. Without your financial help, we could not have proceeded. Your financial match was a requirement and I say "thank you" to everyone that contributed. I must make another appeal, however. As well as we've supported this cause, we have not done as well with supporting our basic Association expenses. The contributions made to the SMA Legacy Projects are restricted funds and can only be used to support those related efforts. We need to raise the funding level to

We will have very limited storage space in the SMA-VWIL Museum, therefore, we must request that alumni refrain from sending any items without prior coordination with the SMA-VWIL Museum Committee. We know many of you would love to empty your closets and storage lockers of your old SMA uniforms and donate them to the museum, but please hold off for now. Please, do not send any items unless they have first been approved.

In fact we already have a lot of material available for display in the museum. This includes trophies, pictures, plaques, uniforms, swords, complete sets of yearbooks, etc. Therefore, please allow us time to get moved-in and situated so we can better assess our museum display needs. We will post

notices on the SMA Web Site and in the Kablegram to solicit specific articles/material needed for museum display.

In the meantime, the SMA-VWIL Museum Committee is interested in obtaining the following items for display in the museum:

- Books, plays, movie scripts, magazine articles, etc. authored by SMA alumni
- Movie posters
- VHS/DVD copies of commercial movies about or involving SMA alumni

- Historically significant photographs of SMA events

Earle Edwin Arundel Jr., age 65, departed this life unexpectedly at his home in Rolesville, NC. He was born in Washington, D.C.

Earle served in the Air Force during the Korean War in the Strategic Air Command. He later worked as an engineer for Grumman Aircraft Corp. where he worked on the Lunar Module that landed on the moon July 20, 1969. Before he retired he worked for Pepcom Industries in Raleigh, NC.

Mr. Taylor, a big man with a big mustache and a big voice, styled himself the Baron of Bully Hill. He designed and wrote his eye-catching wine labels.

Walter's interests reflected his robust, Renaissance personality, which fit his 6 foot - 3 inch frame.

He was a poet, inventor, flying enthusiast, ham radio operator, a compassionate tennis player and an artist whose sketches and water-colors adorned the quirky labels that still distinguish Bully Hill products.

In addition to his wife, Mr. Taylor is survived by three sons.

IT'S A WEB-BASED WORLD - THE SMA WEB SITE

I bought my first computer in December 1993 for the specific purpose of preparing my resume prior to retiring from the U.S. Navy in 1994. It was a Macintosh Performa 550C. It was and remains a very good, reliable computer. Although now mainly used by my kids to play games, it was built to last.

I went "online" sometime in 1994, using my AOL account that came with the computer. Then, in the fall of 1997, by pure chance, I discovered the SMA Alumni Web Site created by Mal Kantzler, SMA '65, a few years earlier. What a surprise! After I graduated from SMA in 1973, I lost all contact with SMA. I was never contacted by the school and did not even know a SMA Alumni Association existed. Twenty-four years had passed. On the day I found the SMA web site, I had been cleaning out my office at home and came across a box with my SMA yearbooks. As I was looking through the yearbooks and reminiscing, my older son came into the room and was curious about the pictures and boys in uniform. I shared some of that part of my life with

him that day and couldn't stop thinking about SMA the remainder of the day. That evening I went online and did a search for "Staunton Military Academy" and the first "hit" that I clicked-on took me to the SMA web site that Mal created. Watching the photo of the aerial view of the former SMA campus appear on the computer screen was quite a thrill. I then found a page providing an Email Directory of all the SMA alumni that had checked into the web site. At the time, the directory included six of my classmates and I immediately sent each an email to get reconnected. As I surfed around the web site, I found more and more items of interest that continued to stir memories and feelings of long ago times. I felt that I'd found a "home" and a way to reconnect with a part of my past.

Over time, I developed a relationship with Mal and learned how to create web pages under his expert tutelage, including HTML authoring. I soon became an active participant in helping Mal develop and expand the web site. All of this was accomplished via the Internet using email. To this day, we have not met one another, yet we have established a close partnership in maintaining and expanding the SMA web site. Mal has done a wonderful thing in creating the SMA web site - he has done it freely as a service to his fellow alumni. Recently, due to the web site's growth and additional server space requirements, Hunter Henry, SMA '46 has been funding the financial costs to keep the site running.

In the three and one-half years I've been involved with the SMA web site, I've seen its benefits in providing a resource for alumni to reminisce and to reestablish connections with friends and teachers from their days at SMA. The Email Directory has grown ten fold since 1997. The web site also provides an avenue for many of our lost alumni that accidentally discover the SMA web site and become members of the SMA Alumni Association. For an alumni association, it's a valuable tool to post news about the association and to keep alumni informed in-between newsletters or other mailings. But most importantly, it provides a means for alumni to communicate and voice opinions. Best of all - it's FREE!
